WE, the County Board of Elections of Adams County, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give this notice to the electors of the County aforesaid, that a GENERAL ELECTION will be held in the County of Adams, on

**TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 2016**

It being the first Tuesday in November (Polls to be opened at 7 am and will close at 8 pm), at which time the electors will vote by Ballot for the following offices:

- One (1) President of the United States
- One (1) United States Senator
- One (1) Attorney General
- One (1) Auditor General
- One (1) State Treasurer
- One (1) Representative in Congress – 4<sup>th</sup> District
- One (1) Senator in the General Assembly – 33<sup>rd</sup> District
- One (1) Representative in the General Assembly – 91<sup>st</sup> District
- One (1) Representative in the General Assembly – 193<sup>rd</sup> District

**NOTICE - DUE TO THE ELECTRONIC VOTE-COUNTING SYSTEM, THE BALLOT INSTRUCTIONS WILL READ:**

1. TO VOTE YOU MUST BLACKEN THE OVAL ( ) COMPLETELY. An oval blackened completely to the left of the name of any candidate indicates a vote for that candidate.
2. To vote for a person whose name is not on the ballot, you must blacken the oval to the left of the line provided, and write or print the name in the space provided for that purpose.
3. Use only a black pen or marker.
4. If you make a mistake, DO NOT ERASE. Ask for a new ballot.
5. Do not fold the ballot unless voting by absentee ballot.

You may vote a Straight Party Ballot for the party of your choice by darkening the oval to the left of the party of your choice or you may split your ballot by darkening the oval to the left of the party of your choice and voting for the individual candidates in any other party.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
AMENDING THE MANDATORY JUDICIAL  
RETIREMENT AGE

Ballot Question

Shall the Pennsylvania Constitution be amended to require that justices of the Supreme Court, judges and magisterial district judges be retired on the last day of the calendar year in which they attain the age of 75 years?

Plain English Statement of the Office of Attorney General

The purpose of the ballot question is to amend the Pennsylvania Constitution to require that justices, judges and justices of the peace (known as magisterial district judges) be retired on the last day of the calendar year in which they attain the age of 75 years.

Presently, the Pennsylvania Constitution provides that justices, judges and justices of the peace be retired on the last day of the calendar year in which they attain the age of 70 years. Justices of the peace are currently referred to as magisterial district judges. If the ballot question were to be approved, justices, judges and magisterial district judges would be retired on the last day of the calendar year in which they attain the age of 75 years rather than the last day of the calendar year in which they attain the age of 70 years.

This amendment to the mandatory retirement age would be applicable to all judges and justices in the Commonwealth, including the justices of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court, judges of the Commonwealth Court, Superior Court, county courts of common pleas, community courts, municipal courts in the City of Philadelphia, and magisterial district judges.

The ballot question is limited in that it would not amend any other provisions of the Pennsylvania Constitution related to the qualification, election, tenure, or compensation of the justices, judges or magisterial district judges.

The effect of the ballot question would be to allow all justices, judges, and magisterial district judges to remain in office until the last day of the calendar year in which they attain the age of 75 years. This would permit all justices, judges, and magisterial district judges to serve an additional five years beyond the current required retirement age.
