A WORD FROM THE WATER AND SEWER DEPARTMENT.....

We received reports in the office of complaints of cloudy or bubbly water. I would like to try to explain what might cause this.

Occasionally air can become trapped in the water system piping network due to the operation of the pumping system. Under high pressure this air dissolves when water pressure is reduced as it flows to the customer tap; the air comes out of solution as tiny bubbles giving the water a white cloudy appearance. If you allow this water to sit undisturbed you will gradually see the bubbles clear up as the air rises out. This condition is called "Air Entrainment". Occasional dissolved air in the water supply should not be a major concern. If this condition is persistent at your tap please report it to the Borough Office at 717-359-5101 so it can be investigated by Borough Personnel.



FROM THE DESK OF PUBLIC WORKS...

Winter is upon us again, and with the winter months comes snow and ice. In an effort to ease some of the tension that comes with bad weather, the public work's crew asks for your assistance in moving your vehicle(s) from the street when a winter snow arrives. If you live in a cul-de-sac, when snow begins to accumulate you need to move your vehicle(s) out of the cul-de-sac and utilize your off-street parking spaces. This greatly improves the snow removal efforts. Signs have been posted to help snow removal in these areas. This will allow for effective plowing. Property owners with fire hydrants located around their properties are asked to remove the snow from around the hydrant when applicable. This will greatly help in the case of an emergency.

When cleaning your driveway entrance prior to the plows passing through, snow should be blown or shoveled to the right side of the drive way (when you are facing the road). By cleaning the driveway snow away from the



direction of oncoming plows, it helps to prevent the bulk of the roadway snow from being pushed back into your driveway, and please do not throw the snow from your driveway or sidewalk into the street. Snow removal is a tough job and we do not like pushing snow into your driveway any more than you do, but hopefully we can both tackle the job of snow removal and come away at the end with a feeling of a job well done.

WINTER REMINDERS

1. Use the snow emergency routes that are posted on North Queen, South Queen, East King and West King streets.
2. Saving of parking spaces is strictly prohibited.
3. Keep 30 feet back from snow plows.
4. Vehicles that are parked or left standing on a snow emergency route can be towed at the owner's expense.
5. Postal Officials advise that an access path to your mailbox should be large enough to accommodate a vehicle and must be kept free of snow and ice or your mail may not be delivered.



DID YOU KNOW...

A reminder to all property owners regarding the arrival of snow and its responsibilities during these frigid days.

When snow ice begins to accumulate on sidewalks, it is the property owner's responsibility to ensure safety for the pedestrians. In order to assist in this matter, it is mandatory that snow must be removed from the sidewalks within twenty-hours after the accumulation has stopped. Sidewalks must be opened a minimum width of twenty-four (24") inches. Snow must not be deposited, thrown or strewn into the streets or alleys. When ice starts to develop on the sidewalks, salt or an anti-skid material should be applied to help prevent mishaps. It is the responsibility of the property owner(s) to make sure that their rental property's sidewalks are clear. Penalties for not removing snow or ice from sidewalk areas range from fines of \$100.00 to \$300.00, with each day constituting a separate violation. If you have plans to be away over the winter months, please make arrangements to have your sidewalk cleaned.

The saving of parking spaces with chairs, buckets, or any other articles is strictly prohibited and will be removed by the borough without prior notice.

These regulations are intended to protect you as well as make the borough a nice place to live.



HOW YOUR SEWER/WATER BILL IS CALCULATED

A Minimum bill is calculated when there is consumption of 1000 cubic foot or less used per quarter. The charge is \$82.50 (\$27.50 for water and \$55.00 for sewer).

- Water overage is charged at a rate of \$.050 for each cubic foot over the 1000 cubic foot minimum.
- Sewer overage is charged by the amount of water consumed over the 1000 cubic foot minimum at a rate of \$.055.

Example: - 1500 cubic foot consumption

- Water \$27.50 for the first 1000 cubic feet and overage of $500 \times .050 = \$25.00$

Water Total - \$52.50

- Sewer \$50.00 for the first 1000 cubic feet and overage of $500 \times .055 = \$27.50$

Sewer Total - \$82.50

Total Bill - \$135.00

Bills are sent out in the beginning of January, April, July and October and are due the last business day of that month.

There may be times when it is necessary for Borough personnel to visit your property to obtain inside meter readings or to repair or replace a meter. Appointments can be scheduled for this type of activity. We want you to feel secure that the individual entering your property is a Borough employee. Therefore each Borough Public Works employee has been issued an ID card and is prepared to present it to you as requested. The Borough vehicles also display the Borough logo. You may also contact our office at 359-5101 to verify the identity of any of our employees.

The Borough accepts checks, credit cards (Master or Discover) and cash as payments. However, we only accept cash, certified check, credit cards (Master or Discover) for all bills that are 30 days plus past due.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF OF POLICE

First on behalf of the Littlestown Police Department I would like to wish all Borough residents a Happy New Year. It is hard to believe that I have been here a year already, but I must say it has been a pleasure serving as your Chief of Police.

Over the past year we have been seeing an increase in the use of Synthetic Marijuana by teens and young adults. I wanted to bring this up because of the dangers in using these products and to provide parents and young adults with information they can discuss with their children and friends in hopes of preventing the use of these products.

Synthetic Marijuana also known as K2, K4, Blaze and Red X Dawn are smokable herbal blends marketed as being "Legal" and providing a marijuana-like high, have become increasingly popular among teens and young adults. These products consist of plant material that has been coated with research chemicals that mimic THC, the active ingredient in marijuana, and are being sold at retail stores in head shops and over the internet. These Chemicals, however, have not been approved by the FDA for human consumption and there is no oversight of the manufacturing process. These products and others like them are being labeled as incense to mask their intended purpose.

K2 and other versions look and smell like potpourri, over the past year law enforcement has witnessed and have been receiving reports from poison centers, hospitals and



other health agencies that some of the side effects are seizures, hallucinations, vomiting, heart problems and sudden death. It is very important parents become familiar with these products and discuss the potential problems in using these products with their children. Makers of these harmful products mislead their customers into thinking that "fake pot" is a harmless alternative to illegal drugs but that is not the case. Currently the United States Drug Enforcement Administration is using its emergency scheduling authority to temporarily control these chemicals that are used to make "Fake Pot" products. Except as authorized by law it will make possessing and selling these chemicals or the products that contain them illegal in the U.S. for at least one year while the DEA and other Health agencies further study whether these chemicals and products should be permanently controlled or outlawed.

Hopefully this information will assist you in educating your children in the dangers of using these types of products. If you have any questions or concerns we would be more than happy to assist you in any way we can. The members of the Littlestown Police Department look forward to serving the community in the upcoming year. 2011 BOROUGH BUDGET

The Littlestown Borough Council adopted the 2011 Borough Budget at their December 14, 2010 Regular Borough Council Meeting. This adoption culminates five months of laborious effort from both the staff and Council in order to provide a fair and realistic budget for the coming year.

Many worthwhile and necessary projects were included in the budget. Even still, the Borough Council was able to keep the sewer and water rates the same as last year.

The new tax millage rate for 2011, as of December 14, 2010, is 2.3090. This millage rate was provided to us by the Adams County Tax Assessing

Office. This millage rate did drop however this rate will still provide the same amount of tax revenue as the 9.5 mills because the county assessing went from 50% to 100%.



The budget was on display prior to adoption for a thirty-five (35) day period. State law requires only a ten (10) day public review period, but in the interest of encouraging more community participation, the Council began the budget process earlier this year in order to accommodate a longer review period.

Copies of the budget are on display at both the Littlestown Borough Office and the Littlestown Library during normal operating hours. Copies can also be purchased for \$12.00 each.

FIVE SIMPLE FIRE SAFETY MEASURES

Here are five simple things that you can do today to help protect your family from fire.



Do a Smoke Alarm Audit

Do an audit of your home's smoke alarms. (If you don't have UL listed smoke alarms, make a plan to install them on each level of the home, especially near sleeping areas). Check placement: Smoke rises, so smoke alarms should be located on a ceiling or high on a wall. Alarms mounted on the ceiling should be at least four inches away from the nearest wall and those mounted on walls should be four to twelve inches down from the ceiling. Test your alarms and be sure that they can be heard in bedrooms even when the doors are closed. If not, install smoke alarms in the bedrooms. Make sure that your kids know what the alarms sound like. Replace alarms that are older than 10 years and replace any alarm that has been painted over.

Tip: Change the batteries whenever you change the clocks for Daylight Savings Time.



Make Extinguishers Handy

Be sure that you have at least one or more UL listed fire extinguishers in your home. An ABC-type extinguisher is a good all-purpose choice for fires in the home. Check the gauge located on the extinguisher to see if it needs to be replaced or recharged. Also be sure that the fire extinguisher is in an easily accessible location. Remember that fire extinguishers are not designed to fight large or spreading fires. Your number one priority is to have an escape plan and to get out safely. If the fire is small and contained and the room is not filled with smoke, get everyone out and call the fire department; then, you may use the fire extinguisher to control the fire.

Tip: Read the directions and familiarize yourself with the use of your extinguisher now, before you're in the midst of an actual emergency.



Talk Prevention with Your Kids

Talk to your kids about how they can prevent fires. Children under age five are especially curious about fire and need to start learning about the tremendous danger. Take the mystery out of fire and make sure that your kids know the following safety tips:

- Never play with matches, lighters or candles.
- Never play with electrical cords and never put anything in a socket.
- Blankets or clothes should never be thrown on top of lamps.
- Don't turn up a heater without a grown-up's permission.
- If your clothes catch on fire, stop, drop and roll.

Tip: Check under beds and in closets for burned matches or candles. Kids often choose "secret" places to play with matches and light fires. Even "good" kids are curious— teach your kids to always tell you when they find matches and lighters.



Look at Your Home From Your Child's Perspective

Think about how your child sees potential fire hazards in your home by getting down on your hands and knees with them and taking a look around. See any dangling cords that could cause a problem if pulled? Enticing heaters or other appliances? Make adjustments to your home according to what you find.

Tip: Make your floor-tour a game with your kids. Have them point out things they see by playing eye-spy. You'll be surprised by what catches their attention.

Avoid Overloading Sockets and Cords

Do a walk-through of your home. If you see sockets with too many cords plugged in or even too many extension cords around the house, it may be time to have extra outlets installed by a professional. Always pay attention to the acceptable wattage for cords and lamps. Also look for extension cords that are “tacked up” or run under a rug as these could be a real fire hazard for kids and adults.

Tip: The den and the nursery are particularly susceptible to overloaded outlets. Never plug something in unsafely “just this once” or “until I get another power strip tomorrow.”

Things You Can Do to Beat the Winter Chill

- ❄️ Service your heating system at the beginning of each heating season. When using wood fuel for heating, have your chimney cleaned at the beginning of each heating season. Close the fireplace damper when not in use.
- ❄️ Lock in the heat. When using your furnace, set your heating thermostat to 68 degrees or lower during the day, health permitting. Set your thermostat to 55 degrees for the night, or when you will be away for more than four hours. During the heating season, change or clean furnace filters once a month. This will ensure optimal home heating and save energy.
- ❄️ Don't block your radiators or heating vents with furniture or draperies. Keep your radiators, registers and baseboard heaters dirt and dust free. Place a sheet of aluminum foil between the radiator and the wall to reflect heat back into the room. Close vents and doors in unused rooms.
- ❄️ Close the damper when not using the fireplace and turn your heater(s) down when using your fireplace. Store firewood at least 30 feet away from your home.
- ❄️ Install tight fitting, insulating drapes or shades on windows that feel drafty after weatherizing. Keep shades and curtains open during the day on the south side of your home to allow solar heating. Close them at night to retain heat.
- ❄️ Lower your water heater temperature to 120 degrees or “low” (140 degrees or “medium” if you have a dishwasher without its own heating element) to save money. This is also a safety measure to avoid scalding. Install water-flow restrictors in showerheads and faucets.
- ❄️ Do only full loads when using the clothes washer and dryer. Clean the dryer lint trap after each use, and check the dryer vent for clogging. Clean the clothes dryer exhaust duct, damper and space under the dryer. When possible, dry your clothes on a line.
- ❄️ Wash only full loads in the dishwasher. Use the energy saver, air-dry cycle, or, if allowed, open the door and let dishes dry naturally. Check the water hoses on the clothes washer, refrigerator icemaker and dishwasher for cracks and bubbles. Familiarize responsible family members with the gas main valve and other appliance valves.
- ❄️ Use the self-cleaning oven feature only when necessary. Start the self-cleaning cycle immediately after the oven is used to take advantage of pre-existing heat. Clean the kitchen exhaust hood and air filter.
- ❄️ Make sure all electrical holiday decorations have tight connections. Test all ground-fault-circuit-interrupter (GFCI) outlets.
