


THE BOROUGH OF LITTLESTOWN

WATER CONSERVATION

The Borough of Littlestown Water System is under an **Emergency Drought Contingency Plan**. The system is under a DEP mandate to increase the time water is in the pipeline before the first customer after the chlorine is injected into the system. This will require extensive work on some wells and minimal on others. The mandate specifies that wells must be taken off-line, disconnected from the system until work is completed on an individual well basis. This requirement means that a portion of our well be off-line in months ahead. The Plan calls for **VOLUNTARY CONSERVATION ON INDOOR WATER USE** and a complete **PROHIBITION OF OUTDOOR WATER USE OF ANY TYPE** during the plans duration. Please call Tim Topper at 717-359-5101 ext. 34 or Chris Stroup at 717-359-5636 with any questions or concerns. REMEMBER, this is still the same water, only the regulations have changed.

BRUSH COLLECTION

The Borough is providing a bush pile where residents can bring tree branches, limbs and cuttings, small bushes, hedges (without the root ball), leaves, as well as wood products that are unpainted, untreated and free of metal and nails. These items may be brought to the old Lawver property, located beside the Quarry, during regular Borough business hours (Monday through Friday from 7:00 am until 3:30pm). However, there is a small charge of \$5.00 per load and must be paid at the Borough Office prior to drop off. You can make an appointment for drop off at time of payment. The yard waste program is for Borough residents and property owners only. Thank you in advance for your cooperation. WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

Grease continues to be a large problem at the wastewater treatment plant. We need the residents, schools and business of our town to reduce the amount of grease being flushed down the wastewater drain lines. Business and schools need to make sure that grease traps, tanks and pits are properly being cleaned out on regular bases. Residents once grease has cooled, pour grease into a glass or plastic container. Then dispose of it properly (trash). This will help keep our drain lines from becoming slow or clogged completely. Thank you for help in resolving this issue at the wastewater treatment plant.

- Sounds of the **FIRE ALARMS:**


1. The **FIRE ALARM** will be short up and down cycles.

LEARN-TO-SWIM PROGRAM - *Summer 2011*

- CHILDREN MUST BE AT **SIX YEARS OF AGE OR OLDER**.
- All sessions last **one week** (Monday through Friday, except for last session) (Weather Permitting).
- The cost of each session is **\$30.00 per student**.
- Class sizes are limited to **7 students maximum** and a minimum of 3 students.
- Classes are filled on a **first come, first serve basis**.
- A **Skills Test** will be held at the Community Pool the week of June 13th from 11:15am to 11:45am to determine the level your child should enter. Please call the pool (717) 359-7450, to schedule a time. If your child has previously taken American Red Cross swimming lessons somewhere else then please refer to the Certificate to determine which level she/he should be enrolled in this year. For example, if she/he passed Level 1 last year, she/he should be enrolled in Level 2 this year.
- Each class runs **45 minutes** in length.
- **Times and levels may be changed** to accommodate enrollment, which means if there are not enough students signed up for a level to hold it and there are at least 3 on a waiting list for a different level then we can substitute the "popular" level.

LITTLE SWIMMERS SWIM PROGRAM - *Summer 2011*

- All sessions last **one week** (Monday through Friday) (Weather Permitting).

WATER SYSTEM INFORMATION: This report shows our water quality and what it means. If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact Chris Stroup, Water Operator at 717-359-5101 or 717-359-5636. *We want you to be informed about your water supply. If you want to learn more, please attend any of our regularly scheduled meetings. They are held the fourth Tuesday of every month.*

SOURCE(S) OF WATER:

- 1 - Surface water source at the quarry north end of Littlestown Borough
- 13 - Municipal Wells are ground water
 - 3 - South end of the Borough
 - 5 - East end of the Borough
 - 3 - West end of the Borough
 - 2 - North end of the Borough

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium* and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-246-4791).

MONITORING YOUR WATER: We routinely monitor for contaminants in your drinking water according to federal and state laws. The following tables show the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1 to December 31, 2009. The State allows us to monitor for some contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently. Some of our data is from prior years in accordance with the Safe Drinking Water Act. The date has been noted on the sampling results table.

DEFINITIONS AND ABBREVIATIONS:

- *Action Level (AL)* - The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, trigger treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.
- *Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)* - The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
- *Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)* - The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- *Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL)* - The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.
- *Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG)* - The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.
- *Treatment Technique (TT)* - A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.
- *Mrem/year* = millirems per year (a measure of radiation ppm = parts per million, or milligrams per liter (mg/L) absorbed by the body.
- *pCi/L* = picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity)
- *ppq* = parts per quadrillion, or picograms per liter.
- *Ppb* = parts per billion, or micrograms per liter (pg/L)
- *ppt* = parts per trillion, or nanograms per liter.

OTHER VIOLATIONS: We failed to take enough raw water samples after a routine September total coliform sample back positive. One of the check samples taken, as a result of September positive total coliform sample, was also positive, resulting in a total coliform MCL violation. We issued Tier 2 public notice for this violation.

EDUCATIONAL INFORMATION: The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- *Microbial contaminants*, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- *Inorganic contaminants*, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- *Pesticides and herbicides*, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses.
- *Organic chemical contaminants*, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.
- *Radioactive contaminants*, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA and DEP prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA and DEP regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

OTHER INFORMATION:

Nitrate: Nitrate in drinking water at levels above 10 ppm is a health risk for infants of less than six months of age. High nitrate levels in drinking water can cause blue baby syndrome. Nitrate levels may rise quickly for short periods of time because of rainfall or agricultural activity. If you are caring for an infant, you should ask for advice from your health care provider.

Lead: If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Littlestown Borough is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at <http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead>.

HOUSE CHECK PROGRAM :

I want to inform all Borough resident that if you are planning a vacation or will be away from your home for an extended period of time to please take advantage of our house check program. The Littlestown Police Department will do a nightly security check of your home while you are away and contact you if there is an issue that needs to be addressed. To take advantage of this program simply call the station at 359-4511 and provide us with the following information.



1. Dates of vacation to include time of departure and return.
2. Emergency contact names and phone numbers of who we can call in case of an emergency.
3. Any additional information you would like us to be aware of (i.e. alarms, what lights you will leave on, names of persons checking on pets if applicable). This service is free to borough residents and we are more than happy to do it for you.

NATIONAL PRESCRIPTION DRUG TAKE BACK PROGRAM:



The National Prescription Drug Take Back Initiative that took place April 30th was a success, Littlestown resident turned in about 150 pounds of pills that could have fallen into the wrong hands or taken mistakenly by a child. There was a 294% increase in public participation this time and over 12 tons were turned in Pennsylvania alone. Thanks to all of the residents who took the time to bring their medications to us.

SUMMER REMINDERS:

I would like to remind Borough residents that now that summer is here there is always an increase in scam artists that try to take advantage of people and particularly target senior citizens. Please use caution when selecting contractors, driveway sealing contractors and always be cautious of the door to door salesmen that want to enter your home. In addition do not for any reason send money to individuals you do not know or provide them with any of your banking or social security information. The latest scam we are hearing about is that a caller will request money from a senior citizen by telling them that their child or grandchild is in trouble and they need to give them their bank account numbers so they can get the money and help them. The rule of thumb I tell people is that if it sounds fishy or too good to be true give us a call. So please, if you have someone trying to get you to do any of these things or similar things to these, please give us a call before you give them money or bank information and we will make sure they are legitimate. Also if you encounter door to door salespersons in the Borough please give us a call and let us know who and where they are. The Police Department requires them to obtain a permit to operate and we now require them to have a criminal history check done before we issue it.

Remember summer is here and schools are closed so children will be out playing and enjoying summer activities, so please be cautious when driving your vehicle. Enjoy your summer and please feel free to call if there is something the Littlestown Police Department can assist you with.

Message to Homeowners and Businesses:

Avoid problems or liability issues by knowing that your waste materials are properly disposed of or recycled. Make sure the hauler you engage, or contract with is licensed with the Adams County Department of Environmental Services.




Christmas On the Square Update:

I just wanted to remind all Borough water and sewer residents and those whom are served by the sewer system that all billing is **due by the last business day of the month by 3:30 pm** or mailed and postmarked by that date. All other payments after 3:30 pm or not postmarked by the last business day of the month will be considered late. The forms of payment after the due date are CASH, CERTIFIED BANK CHECK AND MASTERCARD OR DISCOVER CARD. There is a 2.45% convenience fee for those wishing to pay by credit card. At this time we DO NOT ACCEPT VISA as a form of payment. If you should have a question regarding your water or sewer bill please call (717) 359-5101.

Also a reminder to all Borough water and sewer residents if you will be gone for an extended period of time please stop by and have your water service turned off at the curb and a \$15.00 turn off fee will need to be paid. When you have returned please also stop by and a \$15.00 turn on fee will need to be paid to have water service restored to the residence. If water is left on at the residence a minimum bill will be accessed to the account.

From the desk of Public Works ...

As summer arrives, I would like to provide information for the residents pertaining to several Borough matters.

As stated in the last town crier, **Lumber Street improvement project** is underway. The Borough's engineering firm HRG has completed the drawings and the bid process is starting. This involves new water mains and services lines, sewer main and sewer laterals, along with storm water piping and inlets and the full depth reconstruction of the entire roadway and sidewalks where necessary. At this time the Lumber Street Wells and South Queen Street Well's will also be upgraded to meet DEP's ground water regulations. The Lumber Street project may be done in phases, due to the different funding sources.

Other activities, the Borough will be **street sweeping** all hard surfaced streets in town starting in August. The public works crew will be posting "No Parking" signs when your street is to be swept three (3) days prior to the start of the work.

The Borough once again is offering a **Summer Clean Up** to all residents and property owners of the Borough. The Borough will be accepting the following items at the stone lot beside the Alpha Fire Company (40 East King Street) on Saturday, July 30th, from 8:00am until Noon. Items accepted consist of chairs, couch/sofa, mattresses, box springs, computers, carpet, dryers, stoves, washers, televisions, refrigerators, freezers air conditioners, etc. Items containing Freon must be removed and we will not be accepting any hazardous materials or tires. A flat rate of \$20.00 per truck load (vehicles up to 1 ton in size). For additional information regarding Clean Up, please contact the Borough Office.


